The Mystery of Faith: Encountering Jesus Christ in the Eucharist

Bishop Anthony has released a powerful and timely Pastoral Letter, "The Mystery of Faith: Encountering Jesus Christ in the Eucharist," calling each of us to a deeper reflection on what it truly means to be a Eucharistic people.

As the Church in Australia prepares for the Eucharistic Congress in 2028, this letter invites us to pause, pray, and rediscover the heart of our faith—the living presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. Bishop Anthony encourages us to consider not just what we believe about the Eucharist, but how that belief shapes our lives, our worship, and the way we receive Communion.

In that spirit of renewal, and after broad consultation, the Diocese will resume the reception of the Precious Blood from the chalice at Mass beginning on the Solemnity of Christ the King, Sunday 23 November 2025—a significant and welcome step following the suspension during the COVID-19 pandemic.

I warmly encourage you to take a copy of the Pastoral Letter for your prayerful reading. Let it be a source of inspiration and renewal as we walk together toward a deeper encounter with Christ in the Eucharist. *Fr Chima*



Our Spiritual Journey Week 2 – The Power of Prayer

In the first week of *Our Spiritual Journey* series, we looked at the topic of 'The Search for Happiness' and the importance of seeking real joy and peace – not merely the "emotion" of happiness – through a silence that is

focused on attuning ourselves to God. This past Monday we then explored "**The Power of Prayer**", in other words, what is prayer, and does prayer really make a difference?

Prayer is simply the "raising of one's mind and heart to God... a personal and living relationship of the Children of God" with the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, who dwells in their hearts (Compendium, 534). As such, any time I think of God, whether to ask Him for help with something, or to thank Him, or to even take a moment to admire His creation, I am communicating with God.

In this sense, then, prayer can be quite **spontaneous and informal:** it can happen in the privacy of one's bedroom, while driving or on public transport, or walking to the shops, etc. However, often when people think of prayer, they think of the **formal and solemn** form: like attending liturgical celebrations, and listening to beautiful hymns. As we go with this series, we will discuss how both forms – spontaneous and formal – are actually important aspects of our prayer life.

The other question we explored last Monday was whether prayer really makes a difference? Does God always answer our prayers? And the answer is: **sometimes**, **but not always!** Oftentimes when we pray we will feel close to God, and we will experience peace in the knowledge that we have entrusted our cares to a higher power, who loves us and wants what's good for us. However, at other times we will feel our prayers are not answered, and that God almost feels distant. It is through this experience that God is calling us to have faith in the "darkness and mystery of silence"; that His ways are beyond our ways, and we do not always understand the full picture, so we are called to trust in God's providence (Is 55:8-9).

We must never doubt, though, in the efficacy of prayer, because Christian prayer always unites us with God the Father through the prayer of Jesus. As such, when we make our petitions in the name of Jesus we can be sure that they are always heard. Though, like Abraham, we are called to continue to believe in the fidelity of God even during times of Trial (Compendium, 536, 545).

Indeed, it is precisely during times of trial that we experience the most fruitful growth in our spiritual lives. As such, we must not allow ourselves to become discouraged in the face of difficulties or the multitude of distractions in our modern lives. Rather, perseverance in prayer with trust and humility, despite feelings of spiritual dryness and without feelings of consolation, will increase our faith and strengthen our spiritual lives in ways we may not perceive (Compendium, 572-5).

Next week we will explore the topic of "How to Pray".

May **Our Lady Mediatrix of All Graces** teach us to pray, and intercede for us with all the graces we need. Amen!

In our parishes we should be encouraging our young men and women to discern where God is calling them, and support them if they follow His call into religious or priestly life.


We give thanks to Shayne, Huy and Tan for saying yes to God's call and for offering themselves to serve the people.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross - Year C

First Reading

Numbers 21:4-9 (JB)

A reading from the book of Numbers

When those that were afflicted looked upon it, they were healed.

On the way through the wilderness the people lost patience. They spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt to die in this wilderness? For there is neither bread nor water here; we are sick of this unsatisfying food.'

At this God sent fiery serpents among the people; their bite brought death to many in Israel. The people came and said to Moses, 'We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you. Intercede for us with the Lord to save us from these serpents.' Moses interceded for the people, and the Lord answered him, 'Make a fiery serpent and put it on a standard. If anyone is bitten and looks at it, he shall live.' So Moses fashioned a bronze serpent which he put on a standard, and if anyone was bitten by a serpent, he looked at the bronze serpent and lived.

R. Do not forget the works of the Lord!

Give heed, my people, to my teaching; turn your ear to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth in a parable and reveal hidden lessons of the past. R.

When he slew them then they would seek him, return and seek him in earnest. They would remember that God was their rock, God the Most High their redeemer. R.

Philippians 2:6-11 (JB)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians He humbled himself, therefore God had exalted him.

The state of Jesus was divine, yet he did not cling to his equality with God but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave, and became as men are; and being as all men are, he was humbler yet, even to accepting death, death on a cross. But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names so that all beings in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld, should bend the knee at the name

of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of the Father.

Gospel John 3:13-17 (JB)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John *The Son of Man must be lifted up.*

Jesus said to Nicodemus:

'No one has gone up to heaven except the one who came down from heaven, the Son of Man who is in heaven; and the Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him.

Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved.'

All: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.



GOSPEL REFLECTION

Today we celebrate the Exaltation ("bringing to light") of the Holy Cross, commemorating the discovery of Jesus' cross in the fourth century by St. Helena, the mother of Emperor Constantine.

Nicodemus is a Pharisee, a member of the ruling Sanhedrin. Like so many others who heard Jesus, he is fascinated by this Worker of wonders.

He arranges to meet Jesus at night, so as not to attract undue attention. Today's Gospel is a short excerpt from Jesus' response to Nicodemus' questions about his teachings.

Contrary to the image Nicodemus and Judaism have of a powerful, triumphant Messiah who will restore Israel's political fortunes, the real Messiah will suffer and die in order to conquer death and restore life. Jesus invokes the image of Numbers 21: 4-9 (today's first reading): As Yahweh directs, Moses lifts up the image of a serpent on a pole to heal those who suffer from a deadly plague caused by the bite of serpents. The crucified Messiah, too, will be "lifted up" to bring healing and wholeness to this hurting world.

Yahweh is not the God of condemnation and destruction but the God of forgiveness, mercy and reconciliation. The Messiah comes as a "light" to enable humankind to realize the great love and mercy of God.

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
